I. Blameless Ways

What is the positive benefit and intention of the law of the Lord in telling us “no”?

The instruction of the law of the Lord also tells us “yes”. What are some of the *yeses* that God gives to us in His Word?

III. Keep His Statutes

What does the first phrase of Psalm 119:2 tell us to do?

The word “statute” means “witness or testimony”. Of what does the Word of God give witness and testimony to?

What does 2 Tim 3:16-17 tell us are the benefits of God’s Word?

How does the Word of God help us to grow in our relationship to God?

Why is God’s will and God’s Word never in opposition to each other?

IV. Seek Him With All Your Heart

What does the second phrase in Psalm 119:2 tell us to do?

How would you describe doing something “with all of your heart”?

What would “seeking God with all of our heart” look like?

In what ways do Christians struggle with this “wholehearted” commitment?

What is the danger if we do not measure our view of God’s will against God’s Word?
